THE AUTHOR - The quintessential “thoughtful countryman,” Turner Reuter has been a published author, connoisseur, collector and dealer of sporting art for almost forty years. An avid practitioner of all the field sports, he has spent a lifetime exploring the relationship between art and country life.

The author was recently appointed Curator of Fine Arts at The National Sporting Library in the village of Middleburg, Virginia where for thirty years he has been the proprietor of the historic Red Fox Inn. A gun dog enthusiast and a top level shooting coach, he operates a private game preserve at Glenstone, a family compound stretching for hundreds of acres in the shadow of the Bull Run Mountains. He lives there with his wife and their three children, farming the land and raising livestock in a tradition practiced for generations.

THE BOOK - An instant classic, this volume is the first comprehensive, scholarly reference work devoted solely to American animal and sporting painters and sculptors, chronicling the activities of artists in this country over a period of almost four hundred years. Presented alphabetically for practical purposes, the 2,384 artist biographies tell the story of our developing Nation through the animal and sporting artist’s eye.

Animal and Sporting Artists in America shows how artists developed regional styles reflective of the diversity of our wildlife, the rich variety of our domestic animals, and the breadth of our national landscape. With almost one hundred color plates and over three hundred black and white images, many of which are previously unpublished, this volume is indispensable for those who wish to explore the evolution of the genre.

THE ARTISTS - The works of early masters, such as John James Audubon, Edward Troye, Arthur Fitzwilliam Tait, Martin Johnson Heade, and later Frederic Remington are held in important private collections and major museums throughout the United States, while other animal and sporting artists such as Charles Christian Nahl, William Herbert Dunton, Alexander Pope, Franklin Brooke Voss, and Robert F. Kuhn are only just beginning to achieve the public recognition they deserve.

Iconic American artists, often best known for their works in other genres, such as George Caleb Bingham, Albert Bierstadt, Thomas Eakins, Winslow Homer, John Singer Sargent, William Merritt Chase, George Bellows, and Andrew Wyeth have also provided a rich legacy of animal imagery that can be appreciated by anyone who loves American art, the land, its animals, and our field sports.

THE PUBLISHER - The National Sporting Library in Middleburg, Virginia holds a spectacular collection of 16,000 sporting books, including periodicals, archives and manuscripts, rare books, photography, and film. The NSL was founded in 1954 by George L. Ohrstrom, Sr. and Alexander Mackay-Smith, MFH, “to preserve and to share the art, literature and culture of horse and field sports.”
